2018 is looking like it will be a fabulous year for ministry and mission! Before I get to that...let me briefly highlight some things from 2017.

In 2017 we had 47 new members! Thank you to our Evangelism Board for their excellent work. Thank you, also, to everyone who greeted and welcomed a new face. It is hard to walk into a church without knowing anyone.

By providing an extravagant welcome, week after week, you make that difficult task easier. The results are in the record number of new members. It takes a village to do this right; thanks for doing your part well.

We finished \$5K in the black for 2017. Plus, we raised our assets over \$93K or an increase of 13%. Thank you to our Board of Stewards and our Board of Finance. When many churches are struggling financially throughout the country, we are setting the standard for financial giving. Some people tell me not to tell you when you have done a good job of giving because they falsely think that folks will stop giving. Wrong! I try to model integrity in my financial giving and I will always tell you the truth in love – even about financial issues. 2017 was a good year!

We were able to reverse the negative trend because of the financial commitment of so many members. You see, they had the vision, the hope, the desire for their church, which they love, to continue on after they were gone. By including the church in their will, the church received a part of their estate. That level of commitment helps buoy us through rough waters and allow us to adjust our sails and soar! We owe gratitude for opportunities today to our ancestors in faith.

But really, the most important part of 2017 was clearly the ministry. Over \$56K was given to outreach causes in the community and world – that's cash donations reaching out with compassion and love. More was given when you consider the non-cash items donated: soup, left overs from the rummage sale, diapers, etc. Plus, think of the value of the learning, laughter, tears, and support. Ponder the fellowship, the challenge to be your very best, and the opportunity to share love, joy, presence, and forgiveness. All of this adding up to a recipe of grace, justice, and an extravagant welcome! In other words, Good News!

2017 was a year when we sought justice, loved kindness, and walked humbly with God. Now 2018 stands before us. May 2018 bring even more love, an increase of kindness from us, and a continual spiritual journey with God. God is giving us the gift of possibility. What will we make of it? Church, it's your move!



Week of Prayer for Christian Unity Brings Christian Brothers and Sister Together



Enemies". Mr. Nassar is a Palestinian Christian farmer and Director of the peace-building center Tent of Nations, located on the family's farm outside of Bethlehem.

Tent of Nations is an educational and environmental farm covering 400 dunams next to the village of Nahalin, on a hill top southwest of Bethlehem. The farm has been in Daoud Nassar's family since 1916 when his grandfather purchased the land known as Dahers' Vineyard.

Just a few more days to Donate!!!

Last year The Church of the Palms won the Silver Ladle Trophy for the most cans of soup collected (Four THOUSAND +) during this fun and helpful campaign to fill the shelves of the Valley View Food Bank to overflowing. We have until February 4th, (Happily enough, it's a SUNDAY) to meet or exceed last years total of four thousand cans or packages of soup.

Have I mentioned we collected four thousand cans of soup last year?!

Let's make it two years in a row!

To What Are We Called?

"Now this was the sin of your sister Sodom: She and her daughters were arrogant, overfed and unconcerned; they did not help the poor and needy." -Ezekiel 16:49

Since 1980 the U.S. has set an average refugee resettlement goal of 95,000 each year and has resettled an average of 85,000 each year. In 2016, 84,995 refugees were admitted to the U.S., the highest in over two decades.

The Refugee Act of 1980 requires that the President recommend a refugee ceiling number prior to the beginning of the fiscal year. Based on world events, President Obama proposed increasing the ceiling of refugees for 2017 by 29% or 110,000. However, it is expected that the total will be about 60,672. The recommendation by our current President for FY 2018 calls for a ceiling of resettled refugees to 50,000. We must remember that a refugee is a person who has been FORCED to leave their country in order to escape from harm in their own country and are unable to return because they fear serious harm if returned. The United Nations decides if the person fits the definition of a refugee and whether to refer the person to the U.S or to another country for resettlement. Only the most vulnerable are referred, accounting for less than 1 percent of refugees worldwide. Prior to acceptance by the U.S., the refugee must go through at least 20 filters while waiting for approval. Most people spend years waiting in squalid refugee camps. Historically refugees have been a special humanitarian concern to the U.S – Remember the words on the Statue of Liberty! Providing safe haven and services for refugees means adequately funding the U.S. Refugee Resettlement Program which provides short term assistance to newly arrived refugees while they become self-sufficient. Assistance includes, helping with English as a second language, providing employment and housing assistance. U.S. funding for the UAC (unaccompanied alien children) program comes from the same budget as the Refugee Program – and 80-90,000 unaccompanied children are expected to need assistance.

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
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Your Social Justice Committee has become acutely aware of the problems facing the social service providers as we began working with the Lutheran Social Service-Southwest organization in Phoenix. Recent cuts from this administration closed all service providers who did not provide service for 100 refugees. The local group provided service for 1200 in 2017. Based on expected cuts, management prepared staffing for 800. However, it appears that 2018 will provide for less than 100 refugees. As this office is part of the national association, the AZ offices will not be closing the local Refugee Program. However, staff will need to be cut including staff who work with and train volunteers. Cuts in funding also affect sharing cuts of administration costs. Arizonians are fortunate in that by giving to organizations which qualify under the Qualifying Charitable Organizations list, their taxes are reduced up to \$400/individual and \$800 for couples filing jointly. Adan Batar, a refugee who worked his way up to director of immigration and refugee resettlement for the Catholic Community Services in Salt Lake City, said "We can rely on our community more than the federal

government." Several members of your Social Justice Committee are volunteering to work with the refugees serviced by the Lutheran Social Services-Southwest. In the midst of a global refugee crisis, the United States must not walk away from its spot as a world leader when it comes to assisting refugees and other vulnerable populations both here and abroad. The administration's proposal is incredibly worrying in that regard. Congress has the authority to maintain the U.S Refugee Admissions Program at a level proportionate to the global crisis and in line with our capacity, history and values.
