The WISE Mental Wellness theme for September is How Does the Loss of Hearing, Seeing, and Moving Effect Mental Wellness?

Each week this month, you will find some strategies and tools2thrive regarding sensory and mobility loss. As we age, it is no secret that all of our senses wane. Eyesight gets fuzzier, hearing slowly diminishes, and we can't move around like we used to. For some of us these losses can occur more quickly. When these things happen, we may choose to socialize less often or stop participating fully in life's opportunities. Sensory loss - and its resultant isolation are strongly linked to serious mental health issues, including depression and anxiety. These emotions can have a powerful impact on your lifestyle and overall health.

Sensory loss and depression

A recent study published in <u>Frontiers in Psychology</u> tracked a group of people experiencing dual sensory loss: vision and hearing. Individuals experiencing hearing loss were linked to depression twice as often as those in the control group.

Individuals who experienced *both* vision and hearing loss experienced depression at rates more than three times higher than the control group. Researchers measured anxiety among participants and found similar results.

The study concluded sensory loss was strongly linked to depression – double sensory loss, especially so. This new research was among the first studies of its kind, but it's not the first time sensory loss and mental health impacts have been linked. Indeed, in that regard, this research adds to a mountain of data linking hearing loss with <u>cognitive decline</u>, which increases the risk of both depression and dementia.

Cause and effect remain unclear

It's important to point out this study, and other hearing loss/mental health studies have provided compelling evidence of links. But that's not the same as proving a cause-and-effect relationship.

In other words, even if hearing loss and depression occur in sequence, it's not clear *why* one caused the other or that a direct relationship even exists. Let's go back to our example to illustrate. There are two possibilities:

- Depression may develop because your hearing loss causes physical changes to your brain chemistry. Your depression, therefore, makes going out seem less appealing.
- Or perhaps you develop depression because you miss your friends. Your social isolation removes positive influences and exacerbates mental health fissures that were already there.

It is difficult for scientists to test for a specific cause-and-effect relationship in this instance because the effects are so muddled. It's even likely that **both** potential causes conspire to create a vicious cycle that strongly contributes to depression. There may also be other factors that remain undiscovered.

Maintaining your healthy hearing

Contrary to popular belief (and the assumption underlying our example), it's not inevitable that your senses will fade as you age. That's especially true regarding your hearing. Your hearing may not be as spry as it once was, but you're not necessarily destined to go deaf. If you take care of your hearing, you may be able to maintain it for a long time.

How do you do that? Try these simple recommendations:

- Wear hearing protection in loud environments (or avoid loud environments altogether).
- See your hearing specialist regularly. Your hearing specialist will be able to detect hearing loss when it first occurs, which can prevent further damage.
- Wear your hearing aid. It will slow the progression of hearing loss. It's not just your hearing you'll be protecting. It's also your mental health. The better your hearing remains (and a hearing aid will help), the more likely you are to avoid social isolation.

You just might avoid depression by staving off sensory loss. That's worth celebrating. You may even feel like going out to celebrate.

I-HELP JULY VOLUNTEER REPORT



Lutheran Social Services asks Church of the Palms each month to give an I-HELP volunteer report. They want to know which volunteers and how many volunteer hours are worked within the program each month. In addition to recognizing volunteers it also provides data for funding requests of LSS to support the I-HELP program.

I thought you would be interested in the numbers submitted to LSS in July. Regarding volunteers we had 23 different volunteers drive the bus, provide showers, prepare meals including dinner, breakfast and a sack lunch, and serve as monitors through the night. Others served the meals, cleaned the kitchen and laundered the towels and bedding.

The 23 different volunteers worked 208 hours in July. That is the equivalent of 5-40 hour weeks and an additional day. These 208 hours were expended within 4 Monday nights in July. In the summer we begin at 1:00 p.m. on Monday afternoon to provide a cooling center for relief from the hottest part of the day. After breakfast on Tuesday morning our guests are taken to the Surprise Resource Center by 8 a.m. We host our guests for 19 hours each week.

Many of our 23 volunteers do multiple services each month. Some prepare all the lunches for a month, others monitor the 3-8 shift, prepare breakfast and drive the bus. We have been blessed in recent months to have new members of COTP get involved in I-HELP. We can always use more volunteers; you can chose what you want to do and the frequency.

Randolph Omahana and Scott Patrick coordinate the meals, Vickie Ashenbrenner coordinates the monitors and Mikie Witt coordinates the bus drivers. Max Klinkenborg coordinates the program in the summer months and Nancy Mueller during the winter months. Any of these coordinators can help you find a place of service in I-HELP.



Care Corner – Cancer Conservations

Hearing the doctor say that you or a loved one has cancer is an experience raising many questions. You may feel anxious, afraid, and be overwhelmed and unsure how you can cope during the days ahead. The Care and Support Ministry is excited to offer Cancer Conversations, an opportunity for individuals facing a diagnosis of cancer, newly or previously diagnosed who are seeking support with coping. If you are not the one with cancer but are the caretaker, you are included in the target audience.

The Church of the Palms is fortunate to have a member of the congregation who has offered to share her expertise in providing support for you. Tanya Bellavia has been a certified physician assistant working in the field of oncology for over 22 years in a variety of settings including community based private practice and in a comprehensive cancer center in Buffalo, NY. Prior to becoming a PA, she completed a four year double major in Biblical studies and psychology and a Master's degree in theological studies. In her words, "It was during training in hospital chaplaincy that I had a siminal experience that led to my desire to work specifically in the field of oncology. I am hoping to offer some perspective and guidance based on many years of focus on this topic that personally has affected all of us in some fashion."

The first Cancer Conversation will be held following worship on Sunday, October 2, 2022, in the Boardroom. You can get your snack in King Hall, if desired, and bring it with you.

During the summer, members of the Care and Support Ministry Team have continued to provide care and support to members of our community. We will be returning to regular meetings in September to move forward with other programs to assist you in maintaining wellness and coping with health challenges. DISPENSER OF HUMAN DIGNITY

An oil company owned a factory that produced lubricants such as motor oil and grease. To produce oil of many different viscosity for all engines, and grease for equipment of all uses, it took a very large factory. To keep the factory going a large crew of maintenance workers oiled and greased the extensive equipment. An annual audit discovered that the factory was making no profit for the company because all the oil and grease produced was used to maintain the factory. People were working, machinery was humming, but the purpose of the factory was not being achieved.

What is the purpose of FEET-N-MORE, the shower ministry of Church of the Palms? For the past 18 months we have taken the trailer off the church campus 2-3 times each week. Three to five volunteers go with the trailer and each gives 6 hours of their time. It takes about a thousand dollars each month to cover a myriad of expenses. Beyond keeping our volunteers off the streets and getting into trouble, what is the bottom line accomplishment of the shower trailer ministry?

The shower trailer and volunteers are the dispensers of human dignity. In an article by Emmaline Soken-Huberty, she offers this definition of human dignity.

"At it's most basic, the concept of human dignity is the belief that all people hold a special value that's tied solely to their humanity. It has nothing to do with their class, race, gender, religion, abilities, or any other factor other than them being human." Human dignity is a human right. Simply by being human all people deserve respect. It does not come from wealth, education, status or position; it is common to all members of the human race. Human dignity is dispensed by all we do with the shower trailer.

It starts with the belief that being clean is a human right. We provide a safe, clean, private environment for our guests to wash themselves with soap and their hair with shampoo. We provide a clean bath towel and wash cloth for them to use. Our host churches provide clean clothes for our guests to put on after the shower.

But it is our volunteers that most fully dispense human dignity. We refer to each person as a guest of the shower trailer. We greet them with a smile. We ask if they would like to take a shower as a free gift from us to them. We always treat them as equals without judgment or prejudice. We call them by name after they have registered. We wish them well as they leave and tell them when we will be back and hope to see them then.

Human dignity brings equality, not divisiveness to our world. With a free shower we are making a difference in the world, one person at a time. If everyone's rights were respected and everyone got equal opportunities to thrive, the world would be a much happier, more peaceful place.
