A LETTER FROM PAUL



Our theme this year is "Imagine! Doing Justice, Loving Kindness, and Walking Humbly with God." Requirements. I have to admit that I don't like them. It's not a comfortable word for me. God's requirements aren't the means to earn

God's favor. Rather, God's requirements are the means by which we show our gratitude for God's grace which has brought healing into our lives. Like it or not, I have to give the requirements. What is required of you, of me? Micah 6:8 is very specific about what is required with those who are in relationship with God.

"What does the Lord require of you (and me)?" The Lord requires of you and me to do justice. Now, an entire year's worth of sermons would be insufficient to describe what God's justice is all about. Nevertheless, let me just say a few words. To put it as simply as I know, God's justice is a matter of "righting" wrongs - that is, correcting the wrongs done to people around us. Particularly the ones that have been heaped upon the weak, the poor, and the oppressed. Charity is God's love in the moment while justice is that love extended out into the future.

"What does the Lord require of you (and me)?" The Lord requires us to love kindness. The Hebrew word used here, hesed, means so much and is difficult to translate because no single word in English captures its meanings. Translators use phrases like "loving-kindness," "loving mercy," "a loyal love." Hesed is not primarily something people "feel." It is something people DO for other people who have no claim on them.

"What does the Lord require of you (and me)?" The Lord requires us to walk humbly with God. This is the foundation to do justice and love kindness. To walk humbly with your God is to nurture that relationship that you have with God so that it's a growing and energizing relationship. So that when those opportunities come along to do justice and love kindness, you don't weigh the alternatives – you do them as part of your nature!

At the heart of Christianity, my friends, is our humble walk with God. Because when all is said and done, the only thing people want to see in Christians is God. And if they don't see God in us - if they don't sense that we're walking with God, that we know God, that we care about God, that we love God, they won't believe anything else we say! We'll be talking about these things this year.

As I am writing this article in early January, I want to say, first of all, that it has been my privilege to have served on the Executive Board as Vice-Chair for Ministry for the past two years. While Chairing the Ministry Council's monthly meetings and attending numerous Ministry Team meetings I have seen just how active The Church of the Palms is in caring for our members and friends, and for the larger community and the world. Virtually all of our recent new members at The Church of the Palms have been drawn here because they want to be part of these ministries of love, justice, and extravagant welcome.

Since former President Jimmy Carter's death last month I have been reflecting a lot about his life and work. I remember going to a campaign rally for him in PA when he was running for President. But what I have been most impressed with is how he has expressed his faith in the years since he left the presidency, through his work with the Carter Center and Habitat for Humanity. His faith was much more than an assent to a series of beliefs—it was lived out in service to individuals and communities near and far. Some have described his brand of Evangelical Christian faith as a dying brand, as something very different than the Christian Nationalist doctrine many are embracing today.

Senator John Thune shared a story about Jimmy Carter's faith perspective. In his younger days Jimmy had talked with a Southern Baptist missionary about what made him so successful. The missionary said he kept two loves in his heart—"One love for God, and a love for the person standing in front of me at any particular time." Jimmy took that to heart, and it showed in how he lived out his long life. May our love for God be shown in our love and care for the persons or situations that are in front of us daily. May this be an ongoing resolution for each of us in this new year.


Visualize your mind as a room full of televisions, each on a different channel. Some are loud, some are quiet, but all together are distracting and chaotic. Your joy is to find the TV playing your favorite show and turn all the others off!


Imagine (or look at a photo) of a distant mountain landscape. Take it all in! Now, begin to focus your attention on the mountaintop. Begin to zoom in to the top of the mountain and imagine that you are walking on a trail to the very top. Visualize the details, colors, textures, sounds, and smells of the scene. Focus on the most microscopic of details around you. Breathe in deeply - Exhale completely - Allow your brain to focus on the calm of the smallest leaf or pebble on the trail. Continue your calm breathing and continue to focusing on the smallest of small details and take in the peace.

Light a candle within a darkened room. Focus only on the light of the flickering flame. As the wax begins to melt, envision your worries, stresses, tense muscles from the top of your head to the bottoms of your feet melting with the wax. Allow yourself to gently move with the movement of the flame. Close your eyes and continue the movement and envision yourself as the light. Take a cleansing breath and extinguish the candle.

Sometimes we have so much pent-up energy that we are physically and mentally unable to feel at peace or calm until that energy is released. You can <u>click here</u> to discover some energy burning exercises that are just right for you.

The dedicated members of the Needles and Pins Craft Group have been hard at work this year, knitting, crocheting, quilting, and sewing beautiful items for our craft table. We made \$1,800 from selling our wares from our little tables and this allowed us to contribute to several worthy causes:

\$200 in soup for the Souper Bowl contest with other churches

\$200 to purchase water bottles for children in the Dysart School District.

\$1,000 toward the purchase of a truck to pull the Shower Trailer.

\$300 for scholarships to Dysart Summer Camp.

\$200 for water bottles for children riding the bus home after school.

\$250 for school supplies for Dysart School District students.

\$100 for Hurricane Relief efforts.

In addition to these donations, we created Prayer Shawls for Rev. Shea Darian's grief groups and provided hats and scarves for I-HELP guests. The children served by the center and their families enjoyed their annual Christmas party where 50 children

received new bicycles. Families also received board games to enjoy at their homes. In addition, the children also received toys and clothing. A local food truck provided hot dogs, hot chocolate and dessert at no charge. Tutors are needed to work one-on-one with reading and reading comprehension with those children who are slow readers. This year the center will be working on good health and hygiene. Sample or regular sizes of deodorant, toothbrushes, toothpaste, sanitary items, mouthwash, combs and brushes are being collected for use before school for those children whose families cannot provide them. Shorts or leggings in sizes small to extra large are also needed for those who have toileting accidents. Donations of computer paper, paper towels

and toilet paper also allow the center to utilize funds to serve the youth and adults by offsetting expenses for those necessary items.

Or how do you get time off to make your scheduled visits to your parole officer or urine drug tests? Obviously these four people couldn't do it! But one woman is still smiling—because this is just a game to us. When you have been incarcerated, it is your life sentence. Please join us for this fun, impactful experience!
