YOU CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE IN THIS HEAT WAVE!

HEAT RELIEF BAGS to assist the homeless this summer: We discovered that individually we can do this at little cost. Most items can be found in your pantry or at Dollar Tree. Keep two to three small-filled bags in your car and pass them through the window...it can bring some life saving and comfort items to the homeless this summer.

ONE HEAT RELIEF BAG (Use plastic grocery bags...tie it shut)

*PRIORITY ITEMS (If you can't do them all)

- 1 16oz bottle water
- 1 Nutrition or power bar
- 1 Packet handwipes (Wet Ones or something similar)
- 1 Small tube sunscreen (Size purchased at Dollar Tree)
- 1 Tube lip balm

OPTIONAL ITEMS:

- 1 First aid kit...or package of Band-Aids
- 1 Small tube body lotion hotel/travel size is just right
- 1 Hat (Not required)
- 1 Pair sunglasses
- 1 Cooling towel (If you can find them, or a red or blue bandana handkerchief they can wet to cool down).

Today's sermon is based upon Psalm 97 (The Message).

¹God rules: *there's* something to shout over! On the double, mainland's and islands—celebrate! ²Bright clouds and storm clouds circle 'round God; Right and justice anchor God's rule. ³Fire blazes out before God, Flaming high up the craggy mountains. ⁴God's lightnings light up the world; Earth, wide-eyed, trembles in fear. ⁵The mountains take one look at God, and melt, melt like wax before earth's Lord. ⁶The heavens announce that he'll set everything right, and everyone will see it happen—glorious! ⁷⁻⁸All who serve handcrafted gods will be sorry—And they were so proud of their ragamuffin gods! On your knees, all you gods—worship him! And Zion, you listen and take heart! Daughters of Zion, sing your hearts out: God has done it all, has set everything right. ⁹You, God, are High God of the cosmos, Far, far higher than any of the gods. ¹⁰God loves all who hate evil, And those who love God, God keeps safe, Snatches them from the grip of the wicked. ¹¹Light-seeds are planted in the souls of God's people, Joy-seeds are planted in good heart-soil. ¹²So, God's people, shout praise to God, Give thanks to our Holy God!

Psalm 97 offers profound guidance for our contemporary pursuit of progressive justice:

- We need to ground our activism in ethical principles: The psalm reminds us that our fight for justice should be rooted in a deep commitment to righteousness and equity, reflecting a higher moral order.
- **Challenging oppressive systems:** The powerful imagery of the psalm inspires us to confront and dismantle the systemic injustices that plague our world, from economic inequality to racial discrimination.
- Amplifying the voices of the marginalized: Just as the heavens declare God's righteousness for all to see, we must work to make visible the injustices faced by marginalized communities and amplify their calls for liberation.
- **Rejecting false idols of power and wealth:** The psalm warns against placing our faith in systems that prioritize profit and power over human dignity and justice.
- **Finding joy and strength in collective action:** The rejoicing of the community in the psalm reminds us of the importance of solidarity and collective action in the pursuit of a more just world.
- Actively resisting evil in all its forms: The call to hate evil compels us to actively challenge injustice wherever we encounter it, both in our personal lives and in the broader structures of American society.
- Holding onto hope in the face of adversity: The psalm's promise of deliverance offers hope and resilience to those who are working for justice in challenging circumstances.
- Integrating our faith with our commitment to justice: The psalm underscores the inseparable link between loving God and working for a more just and equitable world.
