FEBRUARY 2026

As shared during our Annual Meeting on January 31, our community is stepping into a new theme for the year ahead:

"A Season for Every Matter."

In our progressive faith tradition, the pulse of social justice is our constant heartbeat. However, as the ancient wisdom of Ecclesiastes 3:1 reminds us, *"For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven."* Embracing these natural rhythms isn't a retreat from our values; it is a commitment to making our activism sustainable and our impact enduring.

Let us commit to serving justice in every season it calls upon us. It's time to "bee" the church!

This ancient service marks the start of the 40 days of Lent, a period for self-examination, prayer, and drawing closer to God. We will receive the sign of ashes as a powerful reminder of our mortality, that we are made from dust, and to turn towards God's grace.

There will also be ashes administered at The Church of the Palms with Pastor Mark at our sacred space, Homeless Jesus sacred for those that cannot make the 12:00pm service. Those will be given at 9:00am and 5:00pm

We welcome all – members, friends, and neighbors – to share in this meaningful time as we seek God's mercy and commit to a deeper relationship with God. We look forward to beginning this holy season with you.

Another Letter from Paul

We are becoming tragically familiar with a figure in the shadows moving through our cities—Los Angeles, DC, Chicago, and New York—a presence clad in the aesthetics of war. In Minneapolis, this figure was responsible for the deaths of Renee Nicole Good and Alex Pretti.



They move with others, a collective of camouflaged anonymity. But there is one feature that has become the ultimate symbol of their power: the face mask.

I remember a different time for the mask just five years ago, during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic; the mask was our most visible symbol of the social contract; it was an act of love. We masked because we recognized the terrifying fragility of our neighbors, our elders, and our immunocompromised kin. To cover our faces then was not to hide, but to say: *"I see your vulnerability, and I will sacrifice my comfort to protect your breath."*

But the masks we see today on the agents of ICE are not salves; they are weapons. Like the hoods of the KKK before them, these masks are designed to dehumanize both the wearer and the witness. By effacing themselves, the agents attempt to escape the moral weight of their actions. They give up their identity so they don't have to look at the humanity of those they detain.

I believe that the face is the primary site of our ethical encounter with the Divine. The face of the stranger summons us; it judges us; it demands that we recognize a life that we cannot own or control.

When we look at the story of Genesis, we see Adam and Eve hiding in the shadows of Eden, covering themselves and fleeing from God. They hid because they were afraid of their own vulnerability. Today, the masked agents reenact this ancient flight. By hiding their face, they seek to avoid the "Divine Trace" found in a face-to-face encounter. They attempt to stand above the law of love by becoming a ghost in the machinery of the state.

The *Imago Dei* is not just skin deep; it is found in our moral responsibility to one another.

The masked agents offer no name and no smile. They establish a hierarchy of "the faceless" over "the terrified." This is not the beginning of a holy community; it is the

breakdown of ethics itself. When we allow our neighbors—the migrants, the seekers, the vulnerable—to be confronted by faceless power, we are witnessing a disregard for the divine image.

As a community of faith, we are called to pull back the veil. We are called to insist on the visibility of the vulnerable and the accountability of the powerful. In a world that seeks to hide behind tactical gear and anonymity, may we be a people who dare to look one another in the eye, recognizing that in the face of the stranger, we truly see the face of God.

If you have a will, you need to update the beneficiaries at least every three years. The passage of time changes everything and your will needs to reflect your most current list of beneficiaries.

In some cases, the institutions we have identified in our will have changed. Some nonprofits close or cease to do the programming that was our reason for supporting them. We will want to drop them from our support and find another organization that does the ministry we want to support.

On a very personal level, we may have identified family members who have died and need to be removed. Or it may be a niece or nephew that has become employed with job security, may have purchased their first home. They no longer need our support.

It frequently happens that grandchildren are added to our extended family and we want to make provisions for their future in our will.

Time changes everything and our will needs to reflect the beneficiaries that we currently want to include in the distribution of our assets.

Creation Justice

Welcome to the February 2026 episode of the Creation Justice portion of the newsletter. I didn't think about it when I prepared the January one as I was going to be out of town the first half of December and had to write it in November! January seemed such a long way off in November. So, not to be remiss -- Happy New Year!

I thought for this installment, I'd give the "New Year" version of a simple list of things that one can do overall, or at least think about, going forward into the year. The last couple of articles have been rather lengthy, so this time I'll give you a break.

So, here we go:

1. We all should be drinking water, invest in a faucet, fridge, or pitcher filter to be shed of the plastic water bottles.
2. While you're at it, get a silicone or metal drinking straw.
3. Consider a "meatless Monday" (Or whatever other day works) to cut down on carbon emissions.
4. Meal plan to help reduce food waste and to use all of your produce lurking in your fridge.
5. Consider a tea ball/infuser rather than tea bags (which are not biodegradable).
6. Buy produce at your local farmers market (it helps local farmers and supplies locally grown produce which reduced carbon)
7. Consider bamboo paper towels, toilet paper and coffee filters. Coffee filters can also be unbleached, or buy reusable ones.
8. Recycle, Recycle, Recycle (OR Reuse, repurpose).
9. Avoid the plastic bottles, return to soap bars & conditioners.
10. Use old t-shirts and/or towels for clean up jobs in the kitchen, garage, basement (Do y'all have those?)
11. Buy quality made clothes/large or small appliances. Ensure they're longer lasting, rather than being landfill fodder in a few months.
12. Use reusable shopping bags
13. Consider joining the library rather than buying book to read only once.
14. Plant bee-friendly plants in your yard such as lavender, zinnias, lilac and honeysuckle (if they're sustainable in your area)
15. Houseplants absorb CO2 in the room. Choose some that are easy to care for.

16. Use rechargeable batteries, and unplug some appliances when not in use. They still use up electricity when on "standby".
17. Limit showers to 5 min if possible to reduce water usable, also don't let the water run when brushing teeth or washing dishes.
18. Leaky tap in your house? Don't ignore it, replace the little rings inside if possible to avoid water waste.
19. "Newer" washing machines can function well using cool or cold H2O cycles. Also, if possible, line dry rather than using a dryer.
20. Research companies for good environmental policies, Certified B-Corp, or using recycled items.
21. Sign up for paperless billing when possible.
22. When turning on the heat or air, consider 1-2 degrees cooler/warmer (depending on the season).
23. Lastly, ensure all windows/doors are weather stripped to prevent leakage.

Homeless Outreach Updates

1. Native Connections Home Base in Surprise. TCOTP volunteers are scheduled for meal preparation on 1st, 3rd, 4th, and 5th Fridays. There is room on the list for individuals to help as fill-ins and for summer months.
2. Pack the Sack lunches will continue on first Sundays during fellowship. Next date is February 1st with goal of 50 shelf-stable lunches.
3. IHELP 2.0 meeting on January 13 – 20 attendees from 4 churches. After a quick review of the work the exploratory team has done, a number of congregation level topics were discussed such as limit on number of beds, setting participant requirements for entry, night monitoring, requirements for case managers. Two members of the Southwest Valley IHELP leadership team explained the steps they took since March 2025 to reopen their doors on February 1, 2026. They are willing to mentor and share program details with Northwest Valley as we explore reopening possibilities for IHELP.
