A Letter from Paul

March 2026

As the sunshine of February transitions to March, we find ourselves in the middle of another Lenten journey. This year, our congregational theme—"A Season for Every Matter"—takes on a profound weight. If we look at the world around us, it feels as though we are living through a season of "breaking down" and "weeping."

In our current national landscape, the turmoil within U.S. leadership can feel like a relentless wilderness. We witness rhetoric that divides, policies that marginalize, and a climate of uncertainty that tests our collective spirit. It is easy to feel parched, much like the desert sands where Jesus spent his forty days. Yet, Lent reminds us that the wilderness is not just a place of testing; it is a place of clarity.

Our mission—Sharing God's Unconditional Love, Justice, and Extravagant Welcome—is not a passive sentiment for fair weather. It is a radical commitment for exactly this kind of season.

- Love becomes an act of resistance when the world feels cold.
- Justice becomes our North Star when leadership falters.
- Extravagant Welcome becomes a sanctuary for those exhausted by the "us vs. them" narrative of modern politics.

Ecclesiastes tells us there is "a time to keep silence, and a time to speak." For a progressive community of faith, this Lent is a time to find our voices. We do not retreat into the shadows of personal piety alone; we use this season of reflection to ask how our faith can serve as a balm for a bruised nation.

How can we turn our Lenten disciplines into tools for advocacy? Perhaps this year, "giving something up" looks like releasing our cynicism to make room for hope. Perhaps "taking something on" means a renewed commitment to local justice initiatives that protect the most vulnerable among us.

The Season of Lent reminds us of our theme of "A Season for Every Matter," for it calls us to transform our reflection into action, venturing into the wilderness of our world's brokenness to be the hands of healing, justice, and God's extravagant welcome in every hurting place.

The Church of the Palms UCC 2026 Annual Meeting Minutes January 31, 2026

Call to Order – Jessica Hermann, Ministry Council Chair called the meeting to order 9:01 am, noting that Executive Board Chair Victoria McWilliams was absent due to illness.

Opening Prayer – Pastor Mark opened the meeting with a prayer.

Establishment of quorum - Jessica called on Usher Captain Anthony Park for the count of members. 42 members were present, establishing a quorum for the meeting. (Note – 4 members arrived after the initial count, bringing the total to 46 members present).

Approval of Minutes – The minutes from the January 2025 Annual Meeting and from the Congregational Meeting on August 10, 2025 were approved by consensus with no discussion.

State of the Church – Pastor Paul provided a look backwards on the Church’s growth and accomplishments since 2017 then proposed a framework to living forward in 2026 with the theme of A Season for Every Matter.

Treasurer’s Report – Pastor Paul presented the Church’s financial status as outlined in the 2025 Annual Report, reviewing the balance sheet of income/expenses and funds in General, Special and Investment Accounts. The Church experienced a 10% increase in income in 2025, negating the need to move funds from reserve accounts. He also estimated a \$20k value of non-monetary donations contributed by the Church and thanked the congregation for their generosity. Proposed Budget for 2026 – Pastor Paul reviewed the proposed budget line by line, providing contextual information as needed. No questions were asked from the floor.

Vote on Budget – Hearing no discussion, Jessica called for the vote to approve the 2026 budget as presented. Online voting on the budget was 26 for and 0 against, and with a unanimous voice vote in favor from the floor, the budget was passed.

Volunteer Engagement Committee Report - John Durbin thanked the members of the VEC and provided a review of the Church's organizational structure, highlighting the difference between the elected slate and appointed positions.

Vote on Slate of Elected Positions – Jessica called for a vote on the slate outlined on page 37 of the Annual Report. A member requested clarification of the Executive Board positions, which was provided by Suzanne. No other discussion was heard. The online voting on the slate was 26 yes, 0 no, and with a unanimous voice vote in favor from the floor, the slate was passed as presented.

Proposed Constitutional Amendment – The Executive Board is requesting a change to Article IV of the Constitution, removing the position of Treasurer from the list of Church Officers and Executive Board members. The Treasurer is now a paid position and does not attend Executive Board Meetings, necessitating the change.

Vote on Constitutional Amendment – Hearing no discussion, Jessica called for the vote. Online voting was 25 for, 1 against and with a unanimous voice vote in favor from the floor the amendment to the constitution was accepted as presented.

Open Discussion – Jessica and the Pastors opened the floor for discussion.

- Pastor Mark presented updated information on IHELP and ongoing discussions with the City of Surprise regarding partnering opportunities. The congregation and community are encouraged to write letters of support to Surprise. Interested people are encouraged to speak with Pastor Mark or Nancy Mueller.

- Deb Bontadelli raised the question regarding the potential for the Church to install car chargers in the parking lot. The Executive Board will take this under advisement and explore the possibility.

Thank You's – Pastor Paul and Pastor Mark thanked everyone who contributed to the Annual Meeting, those who attended or voted online, as well as the staff for whom we are so grateful.

Benediction – There being no further business, Pastor Paul offered a Benediction, the congregation joined together in song and the meeting was adjourned at 10:10 am.

Lenten Study



LIVING THE QUESTIONS

Do you sometimes ponder why there is evil and suffering in the world? Do you wonder why a God who loves everyone allows it? When you hear words like “atonement” or phrases like “Jesus died for our sins”, do you wonder what they mean? Do you question whether Jesus really rose from the dead?

We will live with and ponder these questions as part of our Lenten study. Rev. Dave Klingensmith will lead three sessions on March 5, 12, and 19, from 10:00-11:15 a.m. If you plan to attend, please add your name to the sign-up sheet in the Narthex.

Living the Questions is an audio-visual series on Progressive Christianity that was developed by two pastors from the Phoenix area. Each session includes reflections by theologians and pastors, as well as discussion questions. Will you get all your questions answered? Probably not, but you will learn you have permission to live with your questions.

New Paraments at The Church of the Palms

Recently, paraments for the lectern and pulpit were purchased by Pastor Mark Makowski in memory of his parents, Jim and Marie Makowski. These decorative cloths, like our banners on the sanctuary walls, are there to enhance our prayer experience. The Worship Committee began the process of updating our liturgical sets of paraments a few months ago, after Pastor Mark purchased a stole from Steeplebush Stoles on Etsy. They are located in Rhode Island with clients in the UCC and Unitarian congregations. Bobbie Chapman contacted Nancy Poor, one of the designers, and the communication began about potential designs and colors. The Worship Committee was presented with potential decorative options, and we chose the



blooming tree. The pulpit parament includes a running stream. The new paraments were hand-delivered by Nancy when she came to Phoenix to visit friends for the Super Bowl weekend. The greening season has typically been called "The Ordinary Season" in the Christian worship calendar. Art and beauty have always been part of our Christian tradition. There are many more sets to replace. We're currently working on new Lenten paraments. Lent typically includes the color Purple. Other festivals and seasons include Red for Pentecost and Good Friday. Blue for Advent. White for Christmas/Epiphany and Celebration of Life services. Helping Homeless Kids and Saving the Environment



The Social Justice Leadership Team has combined forces with the Homeless Ministry and the Creation Justice Ministry to help homeless kids by providing them with re-usable water bottles, which will also help protect our environment.

For the last several years, our church has provided bottled water for kids attending Children's First Academy (a school for homeless kids near downtown Phoenix). The water is provided to kids as they ride the bus to and from school in the hot months of the year. This year we will be providing reusable water bottles that the school can provide for students. The school has installed drinking fountains (like the one near our King Hall entrance), which have a spout to refill water bottles and hopefully reduce or eliminate the need for plastic water bottles, which are used once and discarded. Inexpensive eight- and twelve-ounce reusable water/juice bottles can be purchased at Walmart or Target stores. We will be collecting these reusable water/juice bottles during the months of March and April. Please consider picking up a package of these bottles and bringing them to the Donations Area near the Narthex during March. Or, if you wish to donate to support this effort, place cash or a check in a church envelope and mark it **HELP KIDS & SAVE THE ENVIRONMENT**. Thank you!

About the Show

The Straight From the Heart ministry offers hope, healing, and creative expression for incarcerated and formerly incarcerated individuals. This program affirms that everyone deserves a second chance—a chance to rebuild, to be seen, and to share their stories.

This is more than an art show. It is a movement to humanize lives too often overlooked, break down barriers, and foster empowerment.



Bridges Reentry Foundation provides this show as part of its support for women transitioning back into the community. The Church of the Palms has partnered with Bridges through our pen pal and mentoring ministries.

We invite you to explore the artwork on Saturdays or after worship and “get to know” these individuals through their creativity. Proceeds support both Bridges Reentry and the artists themselves.

Let us open our minds and hearts to new perspectives on “the least of these,” as Jesus calls us to do in Matthew 25.

Featured Artist: Maryanne Chisholm

Maryanne Chisholm will be one of our featured artists. She served 14 years of a 27-year sentence for a crime to which another person later confessed. During her incarceration, art became her voice for justice reform and mental health awareness. She created more than 5,000 pieces while in prison, and her work has been shown internationally—from Milan Fashion Week to the Conan O’Brien Show.

Come “meet” these often-isolated individuals through their artwork. This show creates a space for connection, understanding, and renewed possibility—celebrating the power of second chances.

Purim



A Celebration of Courage and Deliverance

Purim is one of the most joyous and boisterous festivals in the Jewish calendar. Falling on the 14th day of the Hebrew month of Adar, which is March 3 in 2026, it commemorates the miraculous salvation of the Jewish people in the ancient Persian Empire from a plot to destroy them.

The holiday is rooted in the Book of Esther. Esther is a young Jewish woman who becomes the Queen of Persia, and her cousin is Mordecai. Haman, the king's advisor, wants to exterminate the Jews after Mordecai refused to bow to him. Haman cast lots—called purim—to determine the date of the massacre. Through fasting and courage, Esther intervened with King Ahasuerus, and the plot was foiled, Haman was punished, and the Jewish people were granted the right to defend themselves against the massacre.

Traditions and Observance

Purim is defined by four primary religious obligations, known as mitzvot:

- **Reading the Megillah:** The community gathers to hear the story of Esther. Whenever Haman's name is mentioned, it is tradition to make as much noise as possible using noisemakers called graggers to "blot out" his name.
- **Mishloach Manot:** Friends and neighbors exchange gift baskets containing at least two different types of ready-to-eat foods.
- **Matanot La'evyonim:** Giving charity to the poor is a central requirement, ensuring that everyone has the means to celebrate.
- **The Festive Meal (Seudah):** Families enjoy a grand feast filled with music and wine.

The Spirit of the Holiday

Children and adults wear costumes and masks, which symbolize how God's hand was "hidden" behind natural events in the story. The most iconic treat is the hamantaschen—triangular pastries filled with poppy seeds, fruit, or chocolate, said to represent Haman's three-cornered hat or his pockets.

Ultimately, Purim is a celebration of "v'nahafoch hu" (the turning upside down)—reminding the world that even in the darkest of times, destiny can flip toward light and victory.

God delivered the Jewish people when all seemed lost. What a message of deliverance that speaks to our current times.

Feet & More Shower Trailer Ministry 2021 – 2026 5000 Showers



The Shower Ministry began with a question addressed to homeless guests who were part of the I-HELP program hosted by The Church of the Palms, "What do you need?" They told us that they could find food, they could find toilets, but they could not find showers.

We explored a couple of options to provide showers for our I-HELP guests. We went to a sporting goods store and bought a 7' x 3.5' tent that had two rooms, one was a dressing room and the

other was the shower. We shared the ideas with the trustees, and they nixed the proposed location. Pastor Paul explored the idea of building an addition that would have showers, storage, and laundry facilities. But we learned very quickly that if we changed the footprint of the building we would have to comply with ADA guidelines for the entire facility, a prohibitive cost.

Max Klinkenborg had experienced portable shower trailers on RAGBRAI, an annual 7 day bike ride across Iowa. Searching on Google he found manufacturers of a variety of trailers. A committee shopped with three companies and chose Nordic American in Fort Wayne, IN. The cost was \$28000. and \$4000. to have it delivered. Then a God-Thing happen within God's timing. The Mission and Outreach committee learned that Roy Spaulding had made a 6 figure gift to the church to be used for social ministry. The Committee was responsible for distributing the bequest and they chose to provide \$45000. to launch the shower trailer ministry.

The shower trailer was first used on February 23, 2021 at the Salvation Army in Surprise. We gave 9 showers and charged 5 phones. The Salvation Army provided lunch and put out clothes for the taking. Circle the City was there to provide medical services and Chance Shelter was there to care for animals. The volunteers that day were Suzanne Boisclair, Dawn Delaney, John Durbin, Ernie Otto, Michael Balch and Max Klinkenborg.

On February 23, 2026 we celebrated the 5th Anniversary of the ministry to the homeless in the Northwest Valley. We have exceeded 5000 showers given in those five years.

Palestine Study Class

In the United States, it is often difficult to follow and understand the complexity of the issues surrounding events in Palestine and Israel. Understanding why a United Nations commission has found Israel committed genocide in Gaza or having sympathy for Palestinians despite Hamas' attacks on Israel can be challenging. The Social Justice Team and Life Long Learning Team at The Church of the Palms will present a three-session class in March to learn about and discuss the events of the past two years in Israel/Palestine.

On Friday, March 6, 10:00-12:00 a.m., we will view and discuss the Oscar-winning documentary of 2025, *No Other Land*. Although this film won multiple awards internationally, it had extremely limited exposure in the United States and has only recently become available to stream.

On March 13, we will learn of the Kairos call, "A Moment of Truth: Faith in a Time of Genocide," sent from our Palestinian Christian siblings, requesting that we engage with them in their struggle for justice.

On March 20, we will examine ways in which we as a church have engaged these issues and explore what we might do as individuals and the church to advocate for a just peace in the Holy Land.
